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- 1. (a) Read the passage given below and answer the questions that follow:
  - small part of this magnificent game." Big B recited these lines at the inauguration of the Indian Premier League (IPL) Season-5. The poem exalts cricket and lyrically expresses the passion we feel for the game. Cricket is more than religion: it tells us how to tide over life's crisis besides entertaining us. It stirs up passions; it makes us deliriously happy when our team wins and reduces us to tears whenever it loses. It also inspires us to be optimistic till the last ball. It tells us that defeat is not the end of the game; that there will be another opportunity to bounce back; there will be another match to cheer for and keep alive the flame of hope for victory. Cricket is a metaphor for life. It could reveal to us the path to transcendence if only we are willing to see the signs.
  - In a 20-over match, there isn't much time to think, either for the players or for the spectators. Players must stay focused and as a spectator, your concentration is fixed on the ball, its contact with the bat, and the result thereof. You live in the moment. Swami Parathsarthi says three things are of primary importance, if you wish to attain success in the game of cricket or in life: concentration, consistency and co-operation. You can concentrate only when the mind is with the action. It shouldn't be in the past or future.

- Besides concentration, consistency and co-operation, there is a fourth 'C' that completes the list commitment. Unless we fully commit ourselves to what we do, we can't become successful in it. IITian and athlete Dinesh Ghodke, Director, Youth, Art of Living Foundation, says: "If you give your heart and soul to something and give your 100 per cent, there is no room for regrets." Day after day, a player has to think about his shots, how to face the ball and how to become a better player. That requires a certain amount of commitment. It's something that we can adopt in our lives and be fully committed to that one thing we really like doing.
- The most intriguing thing about the game is that nothing lasts forever neither fame nor records. Gradually players move away from the limelight into shadows of a glorious past. Life, too, is ever evolving, on the cusp of change, and everything we do is short-lived. Ultimately, all that remains with us is what we have learnt and how we have used it.
- A cricket pitch is a fertile ground for rich stories that talk of grit and bravery, of last-minute dashes to snatch victory from the jaws of defeat. "The team that wins is the team that refuses to give up," says Neeladri Sharma, a young engineer. Similarly, life is also uncertain; you may plan something, but life has its ways of throwing a googly at you. In the end, it's the optimists who come out on the top, unfazed by setbacks.

They are the ones who march forward," he adds. Cricket is, therefore, a metaphor for life. Ghodke's advice is to play the game of life without the burden of getting somewhere so you can play your natural game and enjoy it too.
